SHIRLEY was joined by Mrs. Wiggins, Mississippi field secretary for the NAACP, Dr. C. Thompson, a Bolton, Miss., attorney, and James Anderson, a Jackson physician. They were all at the funeral of one of the Negroes in the Mississippi capital.

SHIRLEY said that while the black community still is a "poor man's life in the ghetto, we think it is just as fortunate that law enforcement officers found it necessary to use tanks, shrapnel and massive forces of men to nerveless warrants on black people."

Dora slammed into the Outer Banks of North Carolina on Friday and then hit the mainland south of Norfolk City, N.C. The storm whipped across North Carolina for several hours, then cut across eastern Virginia and the Chesapeake Bay before it hit Maryland.

Only minor damage to businesses and homes was reported along the main stems where reports of the main stems were reported in Onslow County, N.C., and in Onslow County, Va. In Onslow County several mobile homes were reported damaged and in Chesapeake, Va. the winds tipped trees and damaged about a dozen homes.

Thermal rains from storms that earlier experts said were affected but not caused by Dora hit a long stretch of the Atlantic coast earlier Friday causing flooding in northern

work in Laos when it was fired on by a DMZ antiaircraft gun located about a mile inside the northern portion of the six-mile wide DMZ, the U.S. Command said.

The F-4 streaked into the zone and destroyed the gun with its bombs, said Maj. Chester Hanson of the command. He said there was no damage to the plane.

It was the first time a strike had been reported inside the DMZ zone since last June 30, although there have been raids since then into the DMZ zone. The U.S. F-4 Phantom was on a bombing mission against the Ho Chi Minh trail supply route.

The U.S. Command also reported that two Viet Cong soldiers were killed and 15 wounded in earlier fighting. Enemy losses were not known.
